EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Please note this report refers primarily to the BC SRC online program. For details related to the traditional program offered this year, please refer to: BC Summer Reading Club 2020 Report.

For the first time in 30 years, the public libraries' BC Summer Reading Club (BC SRC) was offered virtually to young readers and their families across the province. This was made possible by a \$65,000 investment from the Government of British Columbia, Ministry of Education, via the BC Libraries Co-operative. Thank you to both organizations for recognizing that a virtual BC Summer Reading Club would provide needed support to children and families now, during a pandemic, and in the future, to meet and help mitigate challenges of accessibility and inclusion.

On June 15th, we joined together to flatten the curve of COVID-19. Throughout the summer a virtual BC SRC meant that young readers were able to follow their passion for reading and still participate in BC SRC by registering and tracking their progress online. For Parents this meant a home-based activity that they could support and monitor while sheltering in place. Activities mounted by BC SRC, specifically to help young readers and their families acclimatize to the virtual SRC, included weekly online programs and events. Ask an Astronomer events, in partnership with the HR Macmillan Space Centre, was a huge hit with families. Feedback from this event encourages us to partner with other community groups in upcoming years to deliver sophisticated and innovative programming through BC SRC for children across the province.

Building and mounting a virtual BC SRC meant that, for the first time, we were able to monitor registration in real time. We were able to provide valuable data and insights to libraries, who could, in turn, build large or small marketing campaigns to promote BC SRC, showcase new reading material and trach how effective their efforts were. Data and insights collected through online registration was also important to funders, and programming staff. For funders, particularly the Ministry of Education, Libraries Branch, we were able to provide weekly registration statistics that helped the Ministry realize the impact of their investment in real time.

By the end of the summer 2020, more than 11,360 Parents or Caregivers had registered more than 16,000 children in the BC Summer Reading Club. Those 16,096 children made more than 300,380 reading entries. This was an astonishing number as we had not discussed the possibility of a virtual BC SRC publicly until 5 weeks before the virtual program was launched. We believe that this level of participation will continue to increase as word of the virtual programs spreads throughout the province.

Parents repeatedly expressed their gratitude for making the 2020 BC SRC possible – children were able to track their reading and participate in online programming, despite library closures over the summer. Virtual BC SRC helped keep the idea of the public library in the forefront of community members thinking. If a child was participating in BC SRC the library was never closed. Services continued, an emphasis on the library's role in supporting education and literacy continued, and through their children, parents also remained connected to the services of the public library.

Launching virtual BC SRC in the spring of 2020 was an unexpected and unplanned response to an unpredictable situation. The work done to date represents the first part of a two-part program to anchor BC SRC in the appropriate technology needed to meet the future of library programming that is accessible and inclusive for all British Columbians.

ABOUT THE WEBSITE

The new public facing website provided children and their families with many online activities and resources to help participate in SRC while libraries across the province dealt with reduced services and capacity to host the program. It is important to note that while the programming resources were available to children across the province, BC SRC encouraged participants to still connect with their local library and make community connections. We facilitated this by linking directly to every participating library in the province whenever possible (how to pick up a reading record, looking for digital reading content, library websites, question about picking up medals, etc.).



27% of our page visits came from our two main activity pages and parent page (top 3 page visits), indicating that users were bookmarking or searching specifically for these pages.



PARTICIPATION IN ONLINE EVENTS AND PROGRAMS

Each week of the program, children and their families found a variety of new activity content including:

- a short instructional activity video and PDF
- colouring sheets
- puzzles/games
- caption contests
- quizzes
- tween specific content (DIYs, Book BINGO, Battle of the Books)

In addition, children were able to:

- create their own stop motion video (instructional video courtesy of SRC artist Bambi Edlund)
- play the <u>Mission Control Trading Card Game</u>

Content was released on a weekly basis in order that it be fresh and new for kids each week. Libraries were provided access to the videos, etc. for their own use, once released on bcsrc.ca via the staff site.

Having a central source for online programs and events made it possible for children from all over BC to participate and have the opportunity to win prizes.



REGISTRATIONS

The reading tracker was available to children and their families for a total of 15.5 weeks, from June 15 – September 30, allowing children flexibility and opportunity to complete their reading challenges.

During that time, we saw the following registrations and entries:

Parents: 11,366Children: 16,096

Reading entries: 300,388

Children were welcome to register all the way up to the end of the summer. As anticipated the majority of registrations occurred in the first 4 weeks of the program.

COMPLETION

One of the things the reading tracker has allowed us to see is how long children continue with their summer reading. This provides us with future insight and information in terms of providing encouragement and motivation – something we have never had access to before.

3,190 children completed seven weeks or more of the program. A large percentage of children (44%) registered but did not make entries in the reading tracker. This shows us the profound importance of early encouragement and the need for libraries to be able to connect with their participants.

PROGRAM REACH

The SRC Reading Tracker made it possible for children from all over the province to participate in the BC SRC, even if their library remained closed for the summer. Children in remote and rural areas were able to track their summer reading and participate in online programs.

Participating Libraries

All BC public libraries participated in the 2020 BC SRC except Tumbler Ridge. Tumbler Ridge chose to participate in the TD SRC and has done so since 2014. The Toronto Dominion Bank sponsors the TD SRC reading program run through the Toronto Public Library.

Age Range of Children Participating

While the BC SRC is funded for and specifically aimed at children K-7, all children are welcome to participate. Children and their families were asked to enter their grade as of June, with the option to enter "other", accommodating younger and older children. As anticipated, the majority of children who participate are in grades K-3, with a reduction in registrations by Grade 7.

SUPPORTING LIBRARY STAFF AND PARENT/CAREGIVERS' PARTICIPATION


- 1. Library staff were provided with an early "preview" of the <u>registration app</u> wireframes on May 22. This was made available as a recording and a PDF from the staff site so all staff would have the opportunity to get a sense of how things would work and to watch on demand. There were 424 views for this video
- 2. Document outlining weekly video activities was sent to staff and posted on staff site, providing assistance with library planning and preventing duplication of work
- 3. Site orientation recorded and released to library staff via BCSRC staff site and BCLA lists: https://youtu.be/dlmYne-6zyQ. There were 388 views for this video
- 4. Timing markers were added to the video description to make it convenient for staff to review relevant sections as needed
- 5. The recording and FAQ were available throughout the summer on staff site
- 6. A pdf or the annual survey, and template to adapt for tracking any in-person registrations, was provided to library staff; also, explanation of how in-person and online registrations calculated
- 7. The weekly activity videos were released on staff site for use by libraries in their own promotion and online programming
- 8. A document outlining weekly video activities was sent to staff and posted on staff site
- 9. A pamphlet was created for schools and parents welcoming them and introducing them to the online format, including how to register
- 10. An online FAQ was created for staff (staff site) and for parents and caregivers (public site). As needs became evident, additional content was added
- 11. A contact form was provided for staff (staff site) and for parents and caregivers (public site) and monitored all summer long
- 12. An exit survey was made available for parents and caregivers (public site); a link to the survey was sent out to every parent who agreed to receive communications from the BC SRC
- 13. Information was shared via the staff site blog, as well as the listservs and SRC programmers were encouraged to share knowledge and collaborate
- 14. Worked with Ministry of Education, Libraries Branch, to create a communications plan to support Ministry promotion of the BC SRC program to schools and families

PARTICIPANT FEEDBACK AND PROGRAM EVALUATION

This year, we created a Parent & Caregiver Survey to receive direct feedback on how this year's SRC worked for families in BC. By increasing our online presence and directly connecting with parents and caregivers through the website and reading tracking app, we were able to send out a survey for the first time. The survey provides insight into completion rates, new program benchmarks, any challenges and limitations, and more. A copy of the survey can be found in *Appendix A*.

Numbers at a Glance

- 676 surveys were submitted
- 1,038 children were represented in the responses (please note that parents and caregivers had the option to complete a single survey for one or more children)
- 877 participants from all grades were represented in the survey as illustrated in the chart below
- 657 respondents included the languages they read in




As for languages, respondents primarily read in English with some bilingual participants. The program encourages children and families to read in whatever language is preferred in the household.



Completion Rates

80% of respondents indicated that their child(ren) completed their summer reading goals. Completion is defined by completing 7 weeks of meeting their individual reading goals. Participants were asked to select their own goals (for example: read for 15 minutes a day) to increase accessibility of the program.

For the 20% that did not complete their summer reading goals, the following reasons were provided:

The majority of participants who responded with Other indicated that they did in fact read, but forgot to keep track of their reading, competing against other media and screens (social media, limiting screen time, etc.), or indicated being unable to visit their local library as an obstacle.


Benchmarks

For this year, we created three benchmarks to measure the success of the program and to continue to track in future years. These benchmarks were based on SRC's values: get children to read more throughout the summer, build up their reading confidence and literacy skills, and create connections to a reading community through participation in SRC and their local library.

It is important to note that the measure of success for SRC is not how many children have completed 7 weeks of reading, but rather how many participants were able to find value in the program. Being able to complete 7 weeks of reading provides participants with additional motivation to continue their reading and involvement with the program throughout the summer. With that said, the three benchmarks indicated below provide us with a snapshot with how SRC impacts the children who register for the program.

The following numbers were based on the **676** respondents (and not the total number of children individually represented in the responses).

Benchmark #1: Read more




69% of caregivers strongly agree and agree that their children read more this summer. 409 out of 465 of these respondents completed their summer reading goals.

Two respondents out of the 13 who *strongly disagreed* completed their summer reading goals. 11 of the respondents did not complete their reading goals and some attributed it to:


- Being unable to visit their library
- Struggled with reading online/online activities
- Needing support to understand the online program
- Felt their children were too young for the program

Benchmark #2: Built up reading confidence



77% of respondents strongly agree and agree that their children built up their reading confidence this summer.

19 out of 27 respondents who indicated disagree or strongly disagree did not complete their reading goals this summer. However, one caregiver provided additional feedback for selecting strongly disagree and noted it was only selected because their children were already strong readers. We will add this to our list of recommendations to provide parents an opportunity to make the distinction.




Children were able to gain confidence and motivation throughout the summer by earning digital badges as shown to the left. One parent shared the wonderful impact that the digital badges had on her child who has ADHD (see parent feedback below for longer quote):

My daughter didn't want to miss a reading day, because she really wanted to click the button on the days she read.

Benchmark #3: Felt connected to a reading community



45% of respondents strongly agree or agree that their children felt connected to a reading community this summer through SRC. 27% of respondents disagree or strongly disagree that their children felt connected to a reading community. Based on additional feedback provided in the comments section of the survey, caregivers

indicated how much their families missed their local library and the community connection it brings. It will be interesting to see how this statistic changes once libraries can offer in-person programming or more virtual programming in following years.

Respondents were also asked additional questions to determine what their interactions with the program were such as using the online reading tracker, participating in weekly SRC activities, picking up a physical reading record from their local library, and if they borrowed material from the library (either digital or physical).

Based on these numbers, it is worth noting that 116 of the respondents who did participate in weekly activities answered that they *strongly* agree or agree that they felt connected to the SRC community this summer. 168 respondents who picked up a reading record from their library answered that they *strongly* agree or agree that they felt connected to their SRC community this summer. 226 respondents who borrowed materials from their library responded that they *strongly* agree or agree that they felt more connected to their SRC community this summer.

It is also worth noting that 20 caregivers wrote in that they would have appreciated email reminders to log onto the tracker and information about new activities. This will be added to our recommendations for next year.

Confirmed Outcomes of the Online SRC Program

AS DEMONSTRATED THROUGH QUANTITATIVE AND QUALITATIVE DATA

The 2020 BC SRC provided a free, online SRC Reading Tracker to:

- support kids throughout the province to keep reading and learning throughout the summer months and prevents skills loss in spite of library closure due to COVID-19
 - provide children and families—particularly those living in remote or rural locations with access to the BC SRC
- provide the support and flexibility needed to help children benefit from participating in BC SRC remotely over the summer months

- provide an online platform to track reading progress that was adaptable to how children and their families chose to set their daily reading goals
- increase confidence in readers and provide motivation through collecting digital badges and a printable completion certificate
- connect parents and caregivers to a dashboard to track their child's reading progress and the digital badges they have earned
- foster learning opportunities through online and at-home (offline) events and activities for SRC participants; create live events and video demonstrations, including hands-on crafts and experiments
- allow for safe online participation with robust security measures, including privacy policy and terms of use for parents and caregivers; and
- support social distancing guidelines for libraries during COVID-19

Staff were provided with resources and supports to ensure they felt comfortable and knowledgeable about the tracking app, the program and events. This included:

- Training for library staff and stakeholders to support their participation and promotion of the online SRC
- Staff were encouraged to share knowledge, activities, and information, and collaborate
- Weekly registration statistics were provided to libraries throughout the summer providing them with current data

Parent Feedback

Throughout the summer, BC SRC received feedback directly from parents and caregivers through our Contact Form and Parent & Caregiver Survey. Parents used this as an opportunity to share what a difference the new online platform made for their families this summer.

I just wanted to write to personally thank you for the work that you and your group does to ensure our children have good reading experiences through the summer reading club. Two years ago, I watched my pre-Kindergarten son go through a time where he was interested in reading, but the frustrations of trying to read were too much to be enjoyable. It was the seven weeks of the summer reading club that pushed him over that exceptionally challenging hump of learning to read full sentences and got him to a place of reading that was no longer too overwhelming. He was so motivated to complete the reading tracker during those seven weeks that the frustrations paled in comparison with the reward of completing his tracker. He is now in Grade 2 and reading books like the unabridged version of The Secret Garden. Now this year, my daughter is about to start Kindergarten and she has gone through the same process - wanting to read, but being very frustrated by it, both expressing desire and resistance. It was once again the excitement of the summer reading club that mitigated the frustration, allowing for incredible progress in her reading. Thank you for providing these opportunities for our children to learn, grow, and challenge themselves. We so appreciate your work for the BC community! I recently found out my daughter has ADHD... I hope you will continue to do this virtual badge next year. My daughter didn't want to miss a reading day, because she really wanted to click the button on the days she read. She doesn't even want to sleep until she reads her book. Over the last 5 years since we started doing the summer reading, we had to remind her to read and write down what books she read. Shared by Anita Shum, a parent of an SRC participant

The following comments were shared anonymously through our Parent and Caregiver Survey:

Thank you so much for running the Reading Club despite the unprecedented times. The online reading tracker was very cool. It was a highlight of my child's summer to pick up her medal. We went as soon as the medals were available. She has medals for every year since she was in kindergarten!

The digital format for this year's club worked so well for my 7 year old son! He loved earning the digital badges and we picked up our medal at our local branch at the end. We also learned how to take e-books out of the library for this and it has worked out very well. I am so happy the BCSRC could move to this online option this year - it worked so wonderfully for us!!! Plus it was very motivating for my son to meet his goal because of the reading club - I definitely think he did more reading because of it! Thanks and keep up the great work!!!

This is a great program that he's done for the past 5 years. He really enjoys this program and looks forward to it each year. He has become an advanced, confident, and accomplished reader - he reads a lot. This program keeps him motivated throughout the summer. We tell all our friends about it every year. This year was a bit different but are thankful for everyone that kept it going! THANK YOU!

We love the summer reading club and thank you for all the wonderful work you all do in making summer reading fun for kids in BC! In past years, we have enjoyed the experience of going to the local library and getting stamps/stickers for each week's reading from our librarians. This year, with covid, we weren't able to do that, but we still really appreciated having this wonderful program available online. Thanks so much!!

We were happy to know that the program was still running this summer and took the program online. My child was always looking forward at the end of each week to see what badge was going to be revealed after her reading was done. It's great that libraries are still able to open and distribute medals to participants! Thank you!!

EXECUTIVE CONCLUSION

We were delighted with the response from BC families and libraries. It was very evident that providing online access to the program increased accessibility in many ways, providing a way for children to participate if they lived in remote or rural areas, if their library was closed due to a pandemic or a wildfire or flood, and if their abilities were better supported by an online format.

Recommendations

- The program needs a way to connect directly to the children and families via the platform to provide ongoing encouragement and support, especially during those crucial early weeks following registration.
- 2. Children and their families needed a way to connect directly to their local libraries for information on reading materials, prizes, and community events, including picking up their medals
- 3. Libraries needed a way to connect directly to their patrons to provide information on reading materials, prizes, and community events, including picking up their medals, as well as encouragement.
- 4. The Parent and Caregiver survey should be adapted to allow for more variation in responses.

During these uncertain times, supporting virtual, remote participation has become even more important. We look forward to continuing and additional support from the Ministry of Education so we can continue to build on the foundations of this year, and incorporate more and more ways for communities to access BC SRC.
